### Information Sheet No.1

### Personnel Records, First World War

RFC, RNAS, RAF, WRAF

This leaflet describes the many sources available to those wishing to trace the career of a former member of the RAF or its predecessors, the RFC (Royal Flying Corps: existed 1912-1918) and the RNAS (Royal Naval Air Service: existed 1914-1918). Information on the service of individuals is held by a number of organisations, including The National Archives (TNA – formerly the Public Record Office), the Royal Air Force Museum and the Ministry of Defence.

Researchers wishing to view material held in the Royal Air Force Museum's library and archives should make an appointment by telephone, fax or e-mail with the Department of Research and Information Services well in advance of their proposed visit. Enquiries should be made in writing (enclosing an SAE) and should contain as much detail as is already known, in particular the individual's name, service number, rank and approximate dates of service, also mentioning any sources which have already been consulted.

The titles of books are given *italics*.

The names of officers serving in the RFC are given in the monthly Army List, which is held by the Royal Air Force Museum, TNA and the Imperial War Museum. RNAS officers appear in the Navy List (held at TNA), and RAF officers are in the Air Force List, which is held by the Royal Air Force Museum, TNA and the Imperial War Museum. The service medal rolls at TNA can be used to confirm the rank and dates of service of a member of the RFC or RNAS: see the appropriate TNA information sheet.

Early RFC and RNAS pilots who learned to fly at civilian schools obtained an Aviator's Certificate from the Royal Aero Club. The Royal Air Force Museum can provide copies of the Certificate Record Cards, which give the pilot's rank or profession, and frequently also a photograph.

Brief biographies of the over 1,400 NCOs and other ranks who joined the RFC before the outbreak of war, some of whom later became pilots, are given in: I McInnes & J V Webb, *A Contemptible Little Flying Corps* (London Stamp Exchange, 1991).

#### Service records: officers

All records are at TNA, unless the officers served beyond 1920. First check in the AIR 76 class. If the officer served before 1 April 1918, check the appropriate class: RFC officers: WO 339 (indexes in WO 338) and WO 374. RNAS officers: ADM 273. The Fleet Air Arm Museum also holds copies of records similar to AIR 76 and ADM 273.

#### Service records: NCOs and airmen

• **RFC (discharged or died before 1 April 1918):** Many of these records were destroyed during the Second World War. The surviving records are available at TNA in the WO 263 and WO 364 classes.

• **RNAS:** Records of all ratings who served in the RNAS at any point are at TNA in class ADM 188.

• **RAF (discharged or died between 1 April 1918 and 1920):** These records, which include the majority of RAF NCOs and airmen of the First World War, are in TNA class AIR 79 (indexes in AIR 78). The Royal Air Force Museum and TNA hold copies of the Muster Roll compiled on the formation of the RAF (1 April 1918), which gives brief details of all NCOs and airmen then in the service, but they are only listed in order of service number, and there is no alphabetical index.

• **RNAS personnel:** further information: In addition to the above, the Fleet Air Arm Museum holds the Enlistment Papers of some RNAS personnel (those who did not transfer to the RAF, and officers who enlisted as ratings but were later commissioned).

• **Women's Royal Air Force (WRAF):** Records of members of the WRAF, which existed 1918–1920, are at TNA in class AIR 80.

#### RAF service after 1920

The service records of officers and airmen who continued to serve in the RAF after 1920 are held by the MOD at RAF Cranwell, and are normally only released to next of kin, on payment of a search fee. The Royal Air Force Museum produces a separate leaflet about such records, which is available on request.

The Air Force List, published monthly 1918–1945, and less frequently thereafter, gives each officer's branch, rank and date of seniority. Those issued between 1920 and 1938 also show the officer's unit and date of posting. Most large libraries hold copies of *Who Was Who* and the *Dictionary of National Biography*, which give details of the careers of senior officers.

#### Casualties

Information on place of burial or commemoration can be obtained from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission; they can also supply some military and personal details. Searches can be made via the Commission's website. The Imperial War Museum also holds copies of the Commission's registers, although these are not indexed.

**Officer, airman and airwoman casualties** for the war are listed in the following books:

- T Henshaw, *The Sky Their Battlefield* (Grub Street, 1995): details the circumstances of Allied air casualties due to enemy action, including wounded and prisoners of war.
- E W Martyn, *For Your Tomorrow: Volume 1: Fates 1915–1942* (Volplane Press, 1998): casualties (including training and non-flying) to New Zealanders from 1915.
- H J Williamson, *The Roll of Honour: Royal Flying Corps and Royal Air Force for the Great War 1914–1918* (Naval & Military Press, 1992).
- S D & D B Jarvis, *Cross of Sacrifice*, 4 volumes (Roberts Medals Ltd, 1993–96).

The Royal Air Force Museum holds an incomplete series of RFC/RAF casualty cards from the years 1914–1925, which include training accidents in the UK.

Other sources of casualty information include the weekly Rolls of Honour in the London Gazette (held by TNA, the Guildhall Library and the British Library) and the magazines *Flight* and *The Aeroplane* (both held by the Royal Air Force Museum). The Imperial War Museum holds copies of the Rolls of Honour of many schools, businesses and other organisations.

#### Medals and Awards

Enquiries regarding unclaimed medals should be made to RAF Disclosures at Cranwell. Rolls for service medals, and some material relating to awards for bravery, are held at TNA.

Citations for medals and other awards were sometimes given in the London Gazette ([www.gazettes-online.co.uk](http://www.gazettes-online.co.uk)) To find a citation, you will need to know the approximate date of the award.
