

Inspiring for the future

By joining the Learning Circle, you will help our Access and Learning team inspire people of all ages, bringing the RAF's story to life for new audiences at both sites. This team works with the Museum's collection to engage, inspire and encourage learning, with visitors of all ages. We deliver a core programme of workshops for schools that support the National Curriculum and offer activities for families and lifelong learners. We play an active role in nurturing partnerships with local communities, inspiring everyone with the RAF story.

Bringing collections to life

Through immersive onsite and online experiences, we bring to life the collections and stories of the Royal Air Force to a broad and diverse audience. Each year, around 60,000 learners enjoy a wide

range of workshops that spark interest in the world of aviation and an insight into both RAF history and the RAF of today. Workshops include STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths), art and literacy, history, Special Education Needs (SEN), and sharing of diverse RAF stories through live performance.

Our London site was a national finalist in the 'Best Venue for History Learning' and our Cosford site in the 'Best Venue for STEM Learning' categories at the School Travel Awards 2019-20, as voted for by teachers. We maintain close partnerships with STEM experts, including RAF Cosford, delivering the STAAR (Summertime Advanced Aerospace Residency) programme - an immersive, hands-on residential camp for Year 10

students who demonstrate an aptitude for one or more STEM subjects.

Conservation Circle £5,000 to £10,000 per annum

Inspiring by preserving our RAF collections for the nation

By joining the Conservation Circle, you will support the RAF Museum's Collections Services team, whose role is to keep the objects in our care safe and preserved for the nation, for future generations to enjoy. This specialist team is responsible for a wide range of objects - from aircraft and vehicles to small items, including medals, documents, fine art, photographs, clothing and textiles - all of which are of national historical importance. This also includes managing accompanying documentation for each object's individual history and ensuring that the environmental conditions in our galleries and stores are optimum for preservation.

Protecting our collection

Our collection is what makes us a National Museum - it reflects the diversity of the RAF and our audiences, encouraging reflection and debate. Without the objects in our care, we would be unable to share the incredible story of the RAF. But objects deteriorate over time - facing daily threats from humidity, light and temperature - and it is our responsibility to identify these threats and protect against them.

The work of the Collections Services team is never done as conservation and proactive object care is vital to the continued development of our collections. The team supports partner organisations (such as RAF Cosford Air Show) by providing aircraft for static display and loan objects to over 140 sites globally. Collections Services also undertake major



projects, including a collections review of around 55,000 objects currently in storage prior to their relocation to a new, purposebuilt Resource Hub at our Cosford site.

The RAF Museum's Michael Beetham Conservation Centre (MBCC), at Cosford, is a centre of international excellence in the conservation and restoration of historic aircraft. MBCC is home to major projects including the Vickers Wellington, one of only two examples in the world, currently undergoing full conservation. The Handley Page Hampden, a rare survivor recovered from Russia, has been rebuilt largely in-house, using as many original parts as possible. A Westland Lysander, famous for its role in delivering Special Operations



Executive agents into occupied Europe during the Second World War, is a newly completed example of the work carried out by the conservation team.

Conservation and maintenance continues on the recovered Dornier 17 Light/Fast Bomber, the world's only surviving example, which sparked global interest when it was raised from the seabed off the Kent coast and brought to the RAF Museum's Conservation Centre for ground-breaking conservation work. When complete, this unique airframe will require a bespoke display environment with temperature control to tell its story of survival after spending more than seven decades under water.

Inspiring with the RAF Museum collection



By joining the Collections Circle, you will support the RAF Museum's role to collect, safeguard and share with the nation our unique collection, making it relevant and accessible for all. The Museum holds around 1.3 million objects, including the largest and most comprehensive collection of aircraft relating to the Royal Air Force anywhere in the world.

Guardians of our heritage

Our Collections and Research team are guardians of the RAF national heritage, curating the collection including the Museum's Archive and Library resource - including photographic, film and sound material, fine arts and medals, smaller items, such as uniforms, and, of course, large objects, notably aircraft, vehicles and even boats. These range from the tiny Avro Rota autogyro, used by the RAF for

secret radar calibration missions before the Second World War, to the world-famous Spitfire, Lancaster and V-Force.

The role of the Collections and Research team includes helping people understand the items within our collection and their stories, carrying out and sharing new research and identifying new objects and stories to develop the collection to ensure that it remains relevant. To achieve this, we must ensure the Museum's collection is easily accessible. The Collections and Research team actively supports people seeking information to help with research and projects, whether for academic purposes or for those wanting to learn more about relatives who have served within the RAF.

Our RAF Centenary transformation in 2018 enabled the Museum to bring

an additional 500 objects from our stores to share with visitors - most of which had never been displayed before. Our Strategy 2030 includes our ambition to build a new Resource Hub at Cosford, bringing together our stored collections and making them accessible to the public through tours and innovative engagement programmes, both online and onsite. This complements our plans to develop a new Research Centre in London with improved public research facilities.


